

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RCAH's oldest tradition, the **Student Showcase**, will feature work from a range of courses throughout the 2nd floor of Snyder Phillips Hall. Explore exhibitions, performances, and posters on view in the LookOut Gallery and RCAH Classrooms and chat with students and faculty about their coursework and creations.

The Trash Clown Collective Troupe (from Professor Richmond's RCAH 314 "Theater for Social Change") presents... "Getting It Right," an actors adaptation of Ayana Elizabeth Johnson's "What If We Get It Right: Visions of Climate Futurity" at 7 p.m. outside the LookOut Gallery.

Students in **Professor Delgado's RCAH 215: Creativity in Everyday Life** explored songwriting exercises with RCAH's music search candidates and local singer songwriter Jen Sygit. **Assistant Director of Arts and Media Learning Marcus Fields** taught and assisted the class in sound recording (Logic Pro) and design (Photoshop) workshops. The creative works shared in this exhibit are song tracks and album designs. To listen to the students' song track, scan the QR code using your phone camera.

Students in **Professor Hamilton-Wray's RCAH 492 Senior Seminar** explored interpretations of America, American culture, American identity and American myths through the lens of American Studies and Film Studies. For their final project, students were tasked with reflecting on their MSU academic career and drawing on 492 course concepts to interrogate and interpret a cultural product, phenomenon or figure. Students adopted a number of formats, such as syllabi, art projects, and digital magazines, to share their findings and outcomes of their inquiry.

The 2024-2025 RCAH Graduate Fellows cohorts will showcase their work with the RCAH community. These presentations provide an overview of the Fellows and their mentors' community engagement, classroom activities, and research through poetry, art, film, language, culture, photography, and youth engagement.

The 18th Spring Showcase presentation of RCAH 112 Public Knowledge features creative work from students enrolled in RCAH 112: Writing, Research, and Technologies. This course asks students to design research projects that produce new knowledge in the arts and humanities. Students present their findings in the form of posters and other media. Individual sections include:

Students in **Professor Richmond's section, "Environmental Justice in Michigan,"**began their research journey by investigating environmental hazards impacting their home communities. They then turned our questioning towards environmental (in)justice: How are different communities impacted inequitably by these hazards, and what societal shifts would be necessary for those most impacted to lead the charge toward repair? In their posters, these students share their research into ongoing environmental justice movements in the state.

Students in **Professor Sheridan's section of RCAH 112** designed research projects around a "cultural problem" and then proposed strategies for addressing that problem.

Students in **Professor Aronoff's section** have been researching issues of "modernist" culture, art, and society in the 1920s, and the relevance of these issues today.

**Professor Yoder's section of RCAH 112** has been exploring both public and scholarly discussions on healthcare ethics to deepen our understanding of these important issues and develop research and writing skills. Student projects cover topics ranging from reproductive rights and assisted reproductive technologies, to palliative care and medical assistance in dying, to personal responsibility for health and the allocation of health care resources.
